Presentations will take place during the gala concert presented by our adjudicators and will include an award for the overall winner of the competition, but also individual awards for outstanding performance in the woodwind, brass and percussion categories.

We are also partnering with leading publishers and manufacturers to bring the latest news on repertoire, instruments, books and CDs to keep you up to date.

Biographies



Paul Archibald

Paul Archibald is the Director of the English Brass Academy. His distinguished career as performer includes his appointments and engagements with the top orchestras in the UK, including the Orchestra of the Royal Opera House, BBC National Orchestra of Wales, London Philharmonic Orchestra, Bournemouth Symphony, London Mozart Players and Britten Sinfonia.



Nigel Clarke

Nigel Clarke is one of the most respected and versatile composers in the world today with his music receiving many performances and broadcasts internationally. Nigel is currently the Associate Composer to the Belgian brass band champions Brass Band Bulzingen and has just taken the post of 'Visiting Composer' to the Middle Tennessee State University Bands.



Philip Cobb

Philip Cobb is currently the Principal Trumpet of the London Symphony Orchestra, accepting the post whilst still only 21 years of age. A former student of Guildhall School of Music and Drama, In 2006 Philip competed in the prestigious Maurice André International Trumpet Competition and in 2007 Philip released his debut solo CD; 'Life Abundant' with the Cory Band and Organist Ben Horden.



Johan De Meii

Johan de Meij is a performer, conductor, adjudicator and lecturer. As a trombone and euphonium player he has performed with major orchestras and ensembles in The Netherlands, from the Dutch Brass Sextet to the Amsterdam Wind Orchestra and Orkest 'De Volharding'. He has conducted some of the leading wind orchestras of Europe, Asia, North and South America and has led master classes around the world.



Anthony Halstead

Horn player Tony Halstead is one of the finest horn players of his generation. As a horn player he has held Principal positions with the London Symphony Orchestra, the English Chamber Orchestra, The Academy of Ancient Music, the English Concert, The Hanover Band and the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment and now enjoys a varied career as a conductor and teacher.



Andrew Marriner

Andrew Marriner has held the position of principal clarinet in the London Symphony Orchestra since 1986. During his extensive orchestral career Andrew has maintained a presence on the worldwide solo concert platform, in the field of chamber music, and as a teacher.



Simone Rebello

Simone Rebello graduated from the Royal Northern College of Music with Distinction and a collection of awards including a major scholarship and The Phillip Jones Prize. She began a solo career which has taken her around the world with concerto appearances, solo recitals, master classes and appearances on national and international TV and radio.



Wing Commander Duncan Stubbs

Duncan Stubbs joined the Royal Air force in 1983 as a member of the Central Band of The RAF and was commissioned as a Director of Music in 1990, being one of the youngest ever commissioned Directors of Music in all three Services. As Principal Director of Music Royal Air Force he looks forward to continuing the challenge of maintaining the musical reputation enjoyed by Royal Air Force Music Services throughout the world.

Gala Concert Programme

Eric Whitacre (B. 1970) Equus (2000)

Equus (from the Latin word for horse) is a moto perpetuo for wind band composed for the wind ensemble at the University of Miami and their director Gary Green. This virtuosic piece is described by the composer as 'dynamic minimalism' and was premiered in March 2000.

Alexander Arutiunian (1920-2012) Trumpet Concerto (1950)

Alexander Arutiunian is ranked among the most important Armenian composers in the generation after Aram Khachaturian. He has created a variety of works, but his most popular piece is his brilliant Trumpet Concerto. Its inspiration was Armenian trumpeter Zolak Vartasarian, who unfortunately died in military action in 1943 before Arutunian had completed the piece. Timofei Dokschitzer gave the première instead, in 1950.

Johan De Meij (B. 1953) Extreme Make-Over (Metamorphoses On A Theme By Tchalkovsky) (2004)

Extreme Make-over consists of a number of musical metamorphoses on a theme from Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky's well-known Andante cantabile (the second movement of his String Quartet No. 1 in D, Op. 11, written in 1871)." It also features fragments from Tchaikovsky's Fourth and Sixth Symphonies and the Fantasy-Overture from Romeo and Juliet.

Ernesto Lecuona (1895-1963) Malaguena

Composer Ernesto Lecuona is a major figure in popular music of this century. He brought the first successful Latin orchestra to the United States. fostered the careers of many of the most influential artists in Latin music. and composed many of its most enduring songs. He achieved the rare distinction of both popular and critical success, competing with the best of Tin Pan Alley as a songwriter while at the same time making his mark as a contemporary classical composer. Malaguena, his first major composition, was introduced by Lecuona at New York's Roxy Theatre in 1927.

Tom Davoren Ascension (2013)

Ascension takes its name from the inspirational phenomenon that was Felix Baumgartner's 'Red Bull Stratos Jump', 2012. In an age where the stimulation of mass media is so prevalent, it is a rare thing for a single event to captivate the global consciousness. However, the sheer magnitude of human endeavor shown by the 'Stratos' project achieved just this.

Ascension was jointly commissioned by the Central Band of the Royal Air Force (UK) and Brass Band of Battle Creek (USA) for performance by Steven Mead, Chris Jaudes and Ben Godfrey.

Paul Mealor (B. 1975) A Hymn Of Endless Light (2012)

A Hymn of Endless Light is a short hymn-meditation for concert band based on Welsh poet, Henry Vaughan's powerful and descriptive vision of eternity. The work is coloured by suspended metal wind chimes representing the starts, and by Celtic counter-melody describing the heart of the ring of light. It was commissioned, and is dedicated too, Wing Commander Duncan Stubbs and the Central Band of the Royal Air Force.

Johan De Meij Sinfonietta No. 1 (2011)

Unlike most of my compositions,
Sinfonietta No. 1 is an abstract, nonprogrammatic work. It consists of three
movements, in which the thematic
material of the opening measures - an
upward fifth jump - returns in various
shapes and forms throughout the piece.
The slow middle section features solo
passages by cello, English horn and
bassoon, all starting with the same fifth
jump. The final movement presents an
Elgar-like march theme, interspersed
with quotes from the second movement,
and ending with the opening theme of
movement I.

Bill Whelan (B. 1950) Highlights From *Riverdance* (Arr. Johan De Meij) (1994/2013)

This new arrangement for wind orchestra of the world famous Riverdance is the second collaboration between Bill Whelan and Johan de Meij. In 2011, they worked closely together on the arrangement of The Seville Sulte originally written for the 1992 World Expo in Seville. The first performance took place on June 25th, 2013 at the Ginger Rodgers Theatre in Medford, Oregon with the American Band College, conducted by Johan de Meij, in attendance of the composer.
